



Average Household Income:

- the average household income is1.650 € per month
- → 46,7 % of all housholds have an income below 1.500 € per month
- > 55% of Berliners were entitled to a social housing

Main Topics in Housing Policy in Berlin:

- Rent cap improvement of the law
- New construction of affordable housing
- Protection of existing rental housing
 - Prohibition of "misuse"
 (tourists apartments, vacancy, demolition)
 - Regulation of rent increase
- Solutions for social housing
 - Long term regulated rents
- Financial support for low-income households

Berlin tenants'association:

- > 160.000 members (120.000 households)
- Membership fee: 108 € a year (reduced fee: 54,00 €) including insurance
- New entries per year: ~ 9.000
- Consultations per year: 90.000
- Main topics of legal advice:
 - Operating costs
 - Rent increases ("Offer of a rental price check)
 - Maintenance problems (mould, faulty windows, failure of heating...)
 - Modernisation
